Message from our Pastor:

Hello all!

I have been busy lately and have not had time to watch the Olympics. But I am hoping to catch some events soon...I like watching table tennis (ping pong).

Whenever I watch the Olympics, I cannot help but think of a special bible verse. It goes like this:

"Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize. Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last, but we do it to get a crown that will last forever." 1 Corinthians 9:24-25

Why do I think of this verse? If it is not obvious, allow me to explain.

I love competition. I think that it brings out the best in people. Although I realize it can also bring out the worst in people, I still think that competition among virtuous souls is a good thing that helps people to strive to achieve their

best...which helps them to be happy and when, during such efforts the person gives appropriate thanks and gratitude to God for their success, it is even a moment of growth in holiness.

So there is much good about the Olympics. It brings out the best in strength, agility, discipline, and perseverance among the human race. That is amazing.

But the reason I cannot help to think of the above mentioned scripture verse is because although there are great gains to be made when someone works, and sacrifices and suffers all the hardship that is experienced in connection with achieving the level of excellence of an Olympic athlete, in the end, they receive "a crown that will not last."

Olympic athletes - and for that matter even pro football, baseball, basketball athletes - receive notoriety, big muscles, and maybe even a big (or enormous) paycheck for their efforts. But how long do those prizes last? Do any of them last more than a few years or a few decades?

That is what the scripture says. Although commendable and honorable, those efforts will only get a prize that will eventually fade away.

But what happens when you practice spiritual discipline, as opposed to physical discipline. It is NOT likely to make your muscles big and it may NOT make you bank account grow and you will likely NOT receive recognition (actually the bible says you should try to AVOID recognition).

That said, spiritual discipline - such as living a virtuous lifestyle, practicing moderation with food and drink, practicing chastity, giving alms to the poor, going to confession, praying, avoiding gossip, slander and foul language - these things will result in gain THAT LASTS FOREVER!!!

Heaven lasts forever and this life lasts for 60, 70, 80 years or so. What we do to make gains through spiritual discipline will last forever, while every gain made physically will disappear.

Please don't get me wrong, I am not trying to be a poo-poo on the Olympics. I love the Olympics and the competition.

My only prayer and hope for our human race is that we as a human race will prize spiritual gains MORE THAN physical gains, because that is demonstrative of a humanity that is endowed with the mind of God.
