It was an excellent day: good fellowship, amazing food and perfect weather. God smiled upon us and gave us a wonderful day.

I love the Fall. I love the cooler air. It's great for running and leaving your windows open at night. I was discussing this with my mother a week ago, and she said she loves it as well but it also makes her sad because she says it means that another year has passed.

I am not as old as her and I don't know what I will feel like when I am her age (she'd beat me if I said her age). I am sort of in between as to whether I mind if the years pass swiftly or slowly.

It's funny how when you are young you cannot wait to get old; old enough to drive, old enough to buy beer (legally), old enough to 'do what you want.'

And then we get a little older and we are not so sure it's that great to get old: driving isn't that fun, beer gives us a beer belly, and usually when we have the 'do what we want' feeling it leads to mistakes and sins.
