Message from our Pastor:

Hello everyone and Happy All Saints day this Tuesday!!! Just a reminder, Tuesday is All Saints and it is a Holy Day of obligation. Thus all are expected to attend Mass. We have Mass at St John at 9am and 7pm, at St Patrick at 7pm and at St Peter and 12:05pm. Plus there are tons of Masses across the city. So find one! No excuses!!!

Also, a big thank you to all who helped with the Mass with the Bishop at St Peter! We have amazing and devout parishioners and I am very proud. He was very impressed with our parish. When the boss is happy, we are happy!!!

For the pastor message, I want to give a few thoughts about All Saints, which is the Catholic holiday for this time of year, and Halloween, which is the secular holiday.

As Catholics, we celebrate All Saints day. What is All Saints day? All Saints day is the day when we celebrate the fact that all our heroes who have courageously lived the virtuous life after the heart of Christ are now reigning in glory with God in heaven. All those great names we love and faces we see on the stained glass, St Joseph, St Francis, St Teresa, St Michael and the many many folks we know and love who have been canonized are in the company of God. These are our heroes. They show us that we can, with the help of God, overcome any and all adversity and become fully the Christians we are called to become. There is no limit to what God can do with even the most lost soul. And the lives of the Saints demonstrate this. And All Saints Day is the day we celebrate that.

And not only that, we also celebrate that we can have a real friendship with them NOW. We can have communion with them...that's why it's called the 'communion of Saints'...like we say in the creed every week 'I believe in the communion of Saints, the forgiveness of sins...'. The Communion of Saints is a fellowship of brothers and sisters that spans across heaven and earth. The Saints already enjoy the party we hope to join.

So what about Halloween?

Halloween is a goofy secular holiday. I don't much care for its roots

If someone were to ask me if I'd let my kids celebrate
Halloween, I'd tell them that I would probably downplay its
importance and try to rather focus on the important day, which
is November 1st. My niece and nephews go to a Catholic school
and they really celebrate All Saints day so that it rightly
overshadows the goofy secular holiday of Halloween.

I used to go trick-or-treating as a kid. In fact I would run from door to door to get as much candy I as possibly could. It's a goofy tradition.

The most important thing to ensure as an adult is that children understand the difference between reality and imagination, between fiction and non-fiction.

There are no such thing as vampires or werewolves. There are such things as souls and saints, and heaven and hell. Witches do not ride on broomsticks. But there are people who do evil things and even people who glorify evil. There are good and holy ways to pray, like in Church or with a Rosary. But there are also superstitious practices which can open up the door to evil such as Ouija boards, Tara cards, and other occult things - that some think are silly games but are in fact dangerous.

Kids do not always understand where fiction ends and nonfiction begins. We know the truths of the spiritual world because God has told us what those truths are. He told us in the bible and he told us in the Catechism through His Church. Otherwise we would have no clue.

But all the other false spiritual practices that we see and hear about are what happens when people try to figure things out through their own efforts alone. Spiritual things are beyond us. It is only with God's help that we 'figure' anything out. As an additional complicating factor, there are in fact actually those who attempt to confuse us, spirits...evil spirits...remember, we have an enemy.

So, if you want to go get some candy, it's your call. But be sure that it is totally overshadowed by what is actually important during this time, All Saints Day.
