If you have been away from the Catholic Church or would like to become Catholic

If you have been away from the Catholic Church, the simplest way to come back into communion with the Church is to make use of the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession). There are regular times when the Sacrament is offered each week and where you can discuss your situation with a priest regarding anything that may be stopping you from practicing the faith (i.e. separation, divorce, etc.) Please contact a priest for more detail (emails are on this bulletin). It is required of all Catholics that they be in full communion with the Church, including making use of the Sacrament of Reconciliation at least annually, to receive Holy Communion at Mass. Please take these steps before presenting oneself for Holy Communion.

If you are not Catholic and would like to learn about the Catholic faith and how you might be invited to the Altar of God, we have a flexible program of instruction and dialogue that allows for you to learn about the faith and ask any questions you might have. If you would like to learn more about this program and how it might fit your needs, please email one of the priests and we will be sure to connect you with the right person. Please note that only actively practicing Catholics are permitted to receive Holy Communion in the Catholic Church.

Top 10 Reasons to Come Back to the Catholic Faith or to Become Catholic (in no particular order)

10. The Bible – the most read book in the world is the Bible. God's holy word and message to every human. The bible was compiled by the Catholic Church and is faithfully interpreted within its storehouse. If you want to read God's love letter to you, come and hear it proclaimed in the Catholic Church.

9. The Priesthood and consecrated life – God calls many men to be priests and many women to be religious sisters. These people are like magnifying-classes for God in the world. They walk around and simply by their presence, by the funny clothes they wear, they remind us that God exists and is present in the world. They are here at the Catholic Church.

8. The Pope – God gave us a special intermediary to speak to us and guide us here on earth. He is the leader of the Catholic Church, the Pope. He is the successor to St. Peter to whom Jesus said "Upon this rock I will build by Church and the gates of hell will never prevail against it."

7. All the Sacraments – God gave us special privileged encounters where we can be assured, without a doubt, of His presence and power. These are called Sacraments. There are seven of them and they are all available only in the Catholic Church.

6. The Holy Family – family life is very important. It is often called the building block of society. But now-a-days it seems like the common understanding of the family is being eroded. Nevertheless, God still believes in the family and draws people to himself in the family. In the Catholic Church, we look to the Holy Family - Jesus, Mary and Joseph - of how family life can be a blessing even in the midst of difficulty. 5. Saints – is it hard to live a good Christian life? YES! Is it impossible to live a good Christian life? Absolutely NOT! Many many people have lived a good Christian life. They are called Saints (they are the people on the windows in the Church). We learn about and celebrate the birthdays of the Saints all year in the Catholic Church.

4. Morality – doesn't it seem that just about every person on TV or with a degree thinks they can define and determine what is right and wrong, what is human and inhumane, good and evil? Instead of chaos, disagreement and ambiguity, God gave a place where we can always get the answer, where his truth can be known. It is in the teachings of the Catholic Church. They are a roadmap for life, for a joyful life...or you can just listen to Oprah ^(C)

3. Mary – did you know that you have a spiritual mother who loves you and who prays for you? Her name is Mary. She is the mother of Jesus and through his humanity and divinity has become our mother. She prays continually for the world, and Jesus is a good boy who listens to His mother O. We love and honor her in the Catholic Church.

2. Confession – every single person in the world, from the Pope to the homeless guy on the street, is a sinner and needs forgiveness. Nobody goes to heaven unless they receive Mercy from God. God forgives 10, 20, 30, 50 years of sins in a few moments in the confessional when someone confesses their sins to Christ in the presence of His minister the priest. But only in the Catholic Church.

1. The Eucharist – God did not abandon the world after He made it. Nor, did he leave it when His Son ascended to Heaven. God is here. Right in this Church in the gold box at the front of the Church; the tabernacle. Jesus Christ is fully present Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity in the Eucharist that Catholics genuflect to when they enter the pew and that they consume each week at Mass. You should see what it's like to consume God and have Him inside of you. It's the best thing in the world.
