Message from our Pastor:

On Tuesday, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, the Year of Mercy as Declared by Pope Francis began. It is a special year where the Catholic Church will have as its focus the overwhelming and everlasting Mercy of God. Let me tell you a story.

There was a king who was a very good man. He was very successful as a king because he was nationally known as being very just and equitable. All respected and loved him. But like all rulers he had to deal with problems and conflict. And this king had one evil enemy, in particular, who use to steal and pillage the king's land. He wreaked havoc in an otherwise peaceful land. Eventually the enemy was caught by the king's soldiers and brought to the king for judgment.

The enemy pleaded for his life. He had heard of the king's just and equitable judgment that he delivered upon all who were subject to him. "I beg your mercy sir. Please have mercy on me and do not sentence me to the punishment I deserve." But the enemy's pleas were rejected. "Why should I let you go," the king said. "For years you pillaged my land and disturbed by peaceful kingdom. Should I not act with justice? Should you not be given the punishment that is due to you as a result of the horrible crimes you committed?" The enemy, who had pleaded with the king responded, "Sir, I fully acknowledge that these horrendous crimes which you speak of I indeed committed. In justice, I deserve death as you say. But sir, in my pleading I did not ask for justice. I asked instead for mercy." The king, taken back by the request of his enemy, thought for a moment about what the enemy had asked. Never before had someone asked for this, mercy. Every other enemy of the king, when captured and forced to stand for judgment always sought to justify himself before king, saying why they were not in fact the guilty party or why some mitigating circumstance was to blame. But here, this enemy, the worst of them all, fully admitted his crime and simply asked for mercy. The king, who had never been asked for such a thing, granted the request of the enemy. Mercy. Full pardon. Complete and immediate release. His subjects were astounded.

The year of Mercy proclaims that every single person is in need of God's mercy. There is no one among the human race aside from the Savior himself, who can stand before God and justice themselves. None of us want God's justice.

But before we can receive the mercy of God, we must fully admit what we have done. Like those previous enemies of the king, we cannot say there was someone else to blame or there was some other thing that forced us to commit an offense before our King, we have to in honesty recognize our crime against the King and simply ask for Mercy. And what we proclaim, during this year of Mercy as declared by Pope Francis, is that God will be moved like that king in the story. He will, like the king, grant us full pardon. And we will be astounded.

I encourage every Catholic to not let this year of Mercy go by without making an effort to seek God's mercy. Most especially, to confess you sin freely and openly in the Sacrament of Reconciliation in the presence of the Church's minister the priest. You will hear those words "I absolve you from you sins" and you will certainly be astounded.
