# Message from our Pastor:

Hello everyone.

I hope everyone has settled back into the 'normal routine' of life since the holidays.

In case you didn't notice, it's now "ordinary time" again in the liturgical calendar. Christmas ended last Sunday with the Baptism of the Lord. We sang "Joy to the World" for the last time, for a little while...unless of course you listen to one of those radio stations that play Christmas music all year long, but that is just weird.

In any respect, it's back to ordinary time.

In one sense this can be sad. Our families probably went back to their own houses (that should be sad about this O), the pretty lights have come down, and the Christmas trees are gone.

But, in fact, it should not be sad. Why?

Because in the spiritual life, it is supposed to be a continual climb or ascent, and therefore, the passage of the Holy Seasons is a blessing.

What do I mean? The spiritual life is supposed to be a continual increase in God's grace. We should day by day, season by season, become closer to God. We should, with the passage of each Christmas, each Easter, each liturgical year, become those who are more readily able to experience intimacy with God. So as the year gets on and life goes back to normal, don't forget to use the things you received during Christmas...and I'm not talking about the slippers, purses, weedwackers or drill sets that you received at Christmas (I got a really nice drill from my parents), but use the spiritual gifts and graces that you received.
