MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR:

It is easy to become frustrated with our economic system here in America. It is very expensive to live and is getting worse. If you have ever been to Los Angeles, you would probably see the 'tent cities' that border highways and back up to neighborhoods. There are literally 'cities' of people living in tents, homeless, all bundled together so many that it looks like a whole city of buildings (except instead of buildings, they are just rows and rows of tents with people living in them).

Los Angeles is a very expensive place to live. But we have our own share of homeless here in the city. I have personally never been to a city in the US with more corners occupied by someone with a sign asking for help than here in Richmond (I am sure there are some, but I've lived in Pittsburgh, Washington D.C., Norfolk/Va Beach, and visited many other cities and nowhere was it as common as Richmond).

How people become homeless is for many reasons. From the conversations I have with folks at our weekly meals at St Peter, the biggest cause is substance abuse (drugs and alcohol). Addiction is like these terrible hurricanes that have hit the US, it rips through an otherwise peaceful place, leaving nothing but destructions and disaster in its wake. There are other reasons for the poverty: sometimes it's parents who were absent and never provided for them as kids, sometimes its criminal records that make employers leery, some have disabilities or sicknesses, and some have just hit a tough patch in their life and need a hand. These last ones are the exception to the norm; most of the time it is

one of the deeper problems mentioned before (that's why for the vast majority there's no quick or easy fix).

Most people want to do something about it or at least they want something done about it. For most, the conscience is activated when they look upon someone in need or in pain. If the problem is fixed then the conscience is assuaged and they again experience interior peace.

Many believe the answer to this problem is in more intervention by the state. Many believe that more government aid can help people get appropriate housing, more government programs can help people get off drugs and more government involvement in supervising people can help make up for absent parents. By-in-large, these people are motivated by a sincere desire to help people who are in need and are looking to the government to fix the problem. This desire to help people is a godly sentiment.

Others disagree with this approach. They acknowledge that all that government will involve more taxes on citizens and/or greater government debt being carried by the nation (the burden of younger generations). They very reasonably feel that they should not be forced by the government to give up what they have earned and made to support people who are at least sometimes in the position they are in because of bad personal choices. Stealing (forcefully taking something that is not yours) is evil, even if it is the government that is doing it.

Where o' where is the answer? The answer is the Church. The Church is what God invented to address these problems.

Those who would have the government fix these problems fail to give proper faith to the institution that was properly created for correct and aid. It is no wonder that as atheism rises and people become overall less religious, they still subconsciously look for a supra-structure to which all people belong that can fix the problems of the world. In doing so, the government is effectively made a 'church.' Unfortunately the government has no religious compass. In fact, in our country, it was designed that way. It can never inspire those who work for it and will be tasked with personally addressing these problems to do so through charity (which is what the Church does). It can only motivate with money, by paying people. And you are never going to pay someone enough to put up with all the burdens can come with walking a person out of addiction, or caring for a parentless child, or the disabled. Only charity (inspired by the love of God) will do that.

Additionally, those who do not want to give up their own money because of the bad choices of others, in a Church, would and should recognize the admonition to tithe their income, which is a gift to them from God, and which would provide for the Church's means to support its charitable works to address these issues. Additionally, they would hear in the Church St Augustine's summation of Church theology 'but for the grace of God go I,' and recall that the only reason they are not in one of those destitute situations is because God's grace has given them two parents, physical and mental health and good friends that didn't lead them into drugs.

The answer is the Church. It is not in the government nor rugged individualism. - Fr. Rossi
