Remember you are dust and you will return to dust.

Those are welcoming words of Lent.

We are going to die. We are made up of dust and will eventually turn back into that dust.

Death can be such a sad thing. We as Christians can deal with it, but it is still hard. Without Christ, death is irreconcilable.

Christ turns death 'on its head.'
