Message from our Pastor:

I have a question for you today.

Is not man's life on earth a drudgery?

Do you think that it is? Do you think that life on earth is a drudgery?

It probably depends upon what kind of week you had last week. Or what kind of week you have ahead of you as to how you answer that question.

Job said that it is. He is the one who asked that question. From the first reading.

"Is not man's life on earth a drudgery?"

Job had been through a lot of bad stuff, so it's not unreasonable for him to ask that question.

What about today? How's life?

I have found that life always has to have a certain amount of 'drudgery' involved. I believe it is our remedy to original sin. It continually purifies us during our journey towards heaven.

We sin less when times are hard. No one wants to be pushed too hard. And no one wants a life of 'drudgery.' But the opposite is filled with problems. A life that's too easy ultimately ends in our own downfall.

We have to keep this in mind when we start to complain about work or any of the challenges we face in a day (taking care of a loved one, taking care of the kids, continuing the battle with a sickness). It becomes 'drudgery' when we forget that the challenge is good for us, that it can be purifying, and that we actually derive our happiness and fulfillment from the victory of the fight.

We measure our happiness against the struggle we face in a given day. No fight = no change for the satisfaction of victory. No struggle = no measuring stick = no perspective = no happiness.

After Job received back all his blessings (he lost them all and then eventually was given them all back), I wonder if his joy after having lost everything and gained it back was more than his joy the first time around. It is almost as if the drudgery of life stretches out ones capacity for happiness, ultimately granting them a bigger capacity.

I think Saints are very happy in heaven because they experienced so much drudgery in life, they really got stretched out so that when they got to heaven they have a larger capacity (a bigger cup to be filled with the joys of heaven).

Thank God for the drudgery of life. It is good for us.
