<u>Message from our Pastor:</u>

The first reading today is a wonderful example of the clarity with which the Apostles spoke the truth of the gospel after receiving the Holy Spirit.

Go back and read it again. But don't just read the selection from Mass but read what happened before this. Here you have these simple men standing in the face of all the powerful and more educated, after having been thrown in jail and warned not to talk about what had happened on the Easter weekend, and instead of listening to the demand to shut up, they rather stand boldly in front of the powerful and tell them, with crystal clarity, the truth of what happened. "If we are being examined today about a good deed done...then all of you and all the people of Israel should know that it was in the name of Jesus Christ the Nazorean whom you crucified...There is no salvation through anyone else nor is there any other name under heaven given to the human race by which we are to be saved."

They spoke with utter clarity. There was absolutely no halfspeak or mixing of words, no worrying about being politically correct. Peter is sure to point out that it was them who crucified Jesus and that the very one they crucified is the only one who can save them and the only one who can save anyone in the entire human race.

Peter is very clear. Clarity in always a good thing. When you go to visit a doctor, you expect him to tell you clearly what is going on. If he is unclear in what he says, you start to worry. He probably doesn't know what he is taking about, is probably unconvinced himself and it's time to get a second opinion.

Clarity is always good. Clarity is good in math, 2+2=4. It's good in chemistry, H20 is the chemical makeup of water, exactly, the atomic mass of carbon is 12.011. It's clear. In technology too just think about your smartphone...there is a lot of clarity in the design and construction of it to make it work...they didn't just simply stick some stuff together. Clarity is even good in relationships. No one gets married because someone says "I sort of like you." You get married when someone says I love you and you are convinced of it. They have to state it clearly. The opposite of clarity is vagueness. Vagueness is always bad. No one is happy in a vague relationship. Vague math doesn't work. No one would take vaguely concocted prescription medicine. No one wants vagueness in their medical recommendations. And no one wants to drive on what is vaguely a road...unless you have a truck with big tires.

Vagueness when it comes to religion and morals is similarly bad. We want to know what is right and wrong. We want to know the truth about God. We want to the best way to worship God. We want clarity, not vagueness when it comes to religion and morals.

Maybe this seems obvious but in fact, there is a temptation to not use clarity when speaking on these subjects. We can be afraid of offending or afraid of ostracizing. We can be unhappy with the possible ramifications of clearly defined moral maxims or of clearly stated religious truths.

But why? Is that rational?

If I am sick and go to a physician, and the doctor is vague when he speaks of my condition, it does not change the objective reality that I have a problem. It simply keeps it unknown.

And contrary to the slogan, ignorance is, in fact, not bliss.

Ignorance as a result of vagueness is an unhappy situation. When it comes to religion and morals, it is a triumph of emotion over reason, a triumph of feelings over truth.

It is always better to have clarity, first, then deal with your options based on what you clearly know, rather than hiding in the disorienting fog of vagueness. -Fr Rossi
