Message from our Pastor:

There are many reasons to have a good prayer life. In fact, there is not an area of life that will not get better if a person takes seriously the importance of implementing a daily prayer discipline into their lives.

Relationships will get better for the person who prays every day. Work will get better for the person who prays every day. Health will get better for a person who prays every day.

Even financial struggles will get better for a person who prays every day.

One of the most urgent reasons today for the necessity of a prayer life is how it keeps a Christian sharp and aware of the many creeping subtleties that can contaminate a Christian's way of thinking. Christians swim in the contaminated waters of moral laxity, hopelessness, exaggerated self-importance, over-indulgence, and relativism. And if they are not careful, they may take in a big gulp of it. They may even drown in it.

But there is possibly of no better example of someone who demonstrates how to stay sharp and free from those un-Christian mentalities than the man whose birthday the Church celebrates today.

Today we celebrate the birthday of St John the Baptist. St John was chosen of all the human race to be the one who would get people ready for who was going to coming next. In order to accomplish this huge responsibility, he had to be someone who had the mind of God. He also had to be someone who was willing to push those godly mentalities despite rejection.

And push he did. He gave everything he had for it. He even gave up his life.

Why was he so zealous?

John the Baptist had the same temptation that everyone else faces every day. He swam in the un-Christian mentalities of his day similar to Christians living today. But he was so intent on his mission to prepare for Christ, that he was determined to remain sharp.

How did he remain zealous?

He prayed. All day. Every day.

John the Baptists lived in the wilderness and prayed all day long. And ate locusts and honey. The solitude of the wilderness is a perfect place for quiet thought. What do you think he did all day out there? He prayed. He thought.

For most of us, we cannot hide in the woods all day to pray. And we are unlikely to fast to the extent that we are hungry enough to eat locusts. But we can be serious about having a consistent and disciplined prayer life. We can retreat to our bedroom and close the door. We can get up before anyone else wakes up. And we can have our mind sharpened by God so that as we go through the day we see things as God sees them, which is the way they really are, without drinking in the mentalities of the world. The only way to be in the water but not drink the water is to each and every day strive to consistently commune with God through prayer. From that quiet time with God a person draws their strength to be godly amidst the pressures to act just the same as everyone else. This may make them seem a little weird at times, like John the Baptist.
